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Letter From The CEO

2021 has been a year of growth for NCFH, expanding from a Team of 15 to over 35 employees. Much of this expansion has been to meet the training and technical assistance needs of farmworker serving organizations as they focused their efforts on combating the COVID-19 pandemic. Although as a country, we are now seeing a decline in the transmission of the virus and progress with vaccination efforts, the last year tested our endurance as we raced collectively to ensure that everyone had access to testing, treatment, and the vaccinations. NCFH, along with our farmworker serving colleagues and partners focused our attention to make these critical services accessible to the farmworker community. Our partnerships with HRSA and CDC strengthened these efforts and supported our activities through continued funding and guidance.

Throughout the year, we have formed new partnerships and have been witness to some amazing work from organizations around the country, who have implemented and developed creative outreach strategies, innovative service delivery practices, and strategic partnerships. We have also documented promising practices to highlight and share with others in efforts of helping everyone mitigate the impact of the pandemic. All these efforts have enhanced the delivery of care and services to the farmworker community and are a testament to the commitment and passion of those supporting our shared mission of improving the health of farmworker families.

We are especially proud of our engagement with farmworkers as advisors in the production and delivery of educational resources and their collaboration with us in understanding the impact of COVID-19 within farmworker communities. We elevate their voices in the work we do and honor and respect their contributions as essential workers in the U.S.

Ag Worker Access Campaign




The Campaign has over **492 members** who have signed up to contribute to this initiative of keeping farmworkers at the forefront of Migrant Health.

The Campaign is guided by the Ag Worker Campaign Task Force, comprised of **24 representatives** of health centers (HCs), primary care associations (PCAs), health center-controlled networks (HCCNs), National Training and Technical Assistance Partners (NTTAP), and other organizations representing education, housing, and labor.



38 health centers have actively participated in the Increase Access to Care (IAC) program, which was inspired by from the Ag Worker Access Campaign. These health centers work strategically with NCFH to develop migrant health action plans to broaden their reach and increase access to care for their farmworker populations.

From 2013 to 2020, IAC program members have seen a **31% increase** in the number of farmworker patients served, compared to non-IAC health centers, which had a 2% increase during the same time period.



COVID-19 Efforts

With partners at the Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), NCFH has worked rapidly to respond to the needs of frontline health center staff and farmworker communities around the country.



Outreach & Education

NCFH staff and subcontract recipients conducted over **half** a **million** in-person or telephonic outreach interactions with farmworkers and their family members. More than **15,000** farmworker work and housing sites were visited during these interactions.

Vaccinations

NCFH staff and subcontract recipients supported the administration of COVID-19 vaccines for nearly **25,000** farmworkers and their family members.





PPE Distributions

Over 583,000 facemasks, gloves, and units of hand sanitizer were distributed at community events and during housing and work site visits by NCFH and subcontracted farmworker-serving organizations.

Farmworker Community Assessments

In partnership with JBS International and numerous local community-based organizations, NCFH conducted surveys with 1,094 farmworkers in selected counties and in-depth interviews with more than 50 farmworkers, farm employers, and organization representatives in California, Florida, Mississippi, New Mexico, and Texas about COVID-19 risk factors, the impact of COVID-19, and vaccinations. Training and TA

NCFH acts as a national expert on topics affecting farmworker health, providing training support and technical assistance to health centers, government agencies, community-based organizations, legal aid organizations, agricultural employers and other farmworker health stakeholders nationwide.






48 educational breakout sessions, **3** plenary sessions, and **2** follow up webinars, providing **17.5** CEU hours across 5-day virtual event.

Washington (13%), North Carolina (12%), Oregon (12%), California (11%), and Texas (6%) were the five states with the largest number of registrants.

18 exhibitors and/or sponsors.

52 organizations were represented in planning committees to ensure multiple perspectives and a diverse offering of content to attendees.

Workshops included presenters representing **69** unique agencies, including universities, HCs, government agencies, non-profits/community-based organizations, PCAs, NTTAPs, and other subject matter experts.


