

U.S. National Pulse on Infectious Diseases among Farmworkers

Keeping a pulse on the health of farmworkers in the U.S.

Network Insights

A poll was not circulated this month, however to view results from previous polls on various infectious disease topics, <u>check out our website</u> (scroll to the bottom). Previous polls were circulated in English and Spanish via email to a total of 284 network contacts. These contacts include **executive and outreach staff of Migrant Health Centers, farmworker-serving non-profit organizations, and health department staff,** and are all affiliated with NCFH through various networks and contracts. Participants serve farmworkers across many states in the U.S. and the vast majority work directly with farmworkers.

NCFH Data Collection Updates: Farmworker COVID-19 Community Assessments (FCCAs)

NCFH kicked off data collection for Phase 3 of the FCCAs in Hillsborough County, Florida. The assessment happened between March 9-12. A total of 314 farmworkers were surveyed, including 144 H-2A guest workers.

The second community assessed was the Rio Grande Valley of Texas, which includes the counties of Cameron, Hidalgo and Starr. Data collection in this community happened in April 23-16. A total of 327 farmworkers were surveyed, including 53 H-2A guest workers.

NCFH is expected to do an additional 4 FCCAs this summer.

COVID-19 and the power of indigenous, Mexican-origin farmworker families in the US Pacific Northwest March 2023
